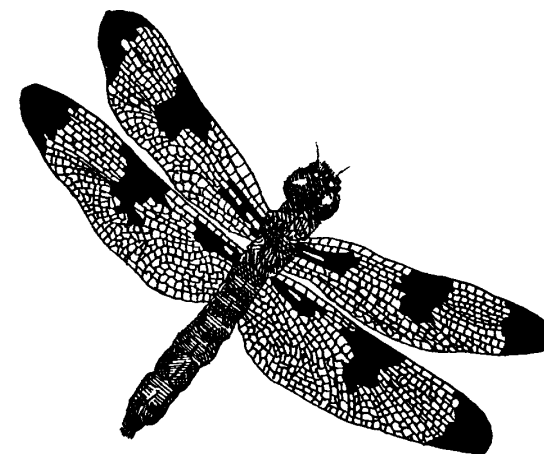

This list of 47 species of dragonflies and damselflies found at Black Hill is incomplete. More observations are needed to find the scarcer and less obvious species. Since the lake is still young, new species are probably still colonizing it. The dates when adults are flying are also approximate and can vary from year to year. As a rule, there are very few around before mid-May or after late September.

Dragonflies and damselflies spend most of their lives underwater as swimming insects with gills. The flying adults emerge from the water to mate and lay their eggs. Most species wander short distances from the water, but a few, such as the Green Darner, are known to migrate great distances to find new bodies of water.

Dragonflies hold their wings out like an airplane when perched. Damselflies, which tend to be smaller and very slender, fold their wings along their body when perched. Three books with pictures to identify many of these species are: Dragonflies of Florida, and Damselflies
